"Francis, go rebuild my house..."

of the San Damiano Cross. At first, Francis thought that Christ meant that he was to rebuild the little church in the San Damiano sanctuary, just outside the walls of Assisi. But he soon realized that Christ was referring to his Church built of living stones, built of the People of God.

You and I, all of us "living stones" in the Archdiocese of Santa Fe, are called to rebuild, or better, to allow Christ to rebuild us so that we reflect more clearly the presence of Christ here in the Southwest. As we emerge from bankruptcy, we acknowledge the past painful years in which we sought to bring healing to those who suffered from clerical abuse and to all of us who were deeply hurt by the horrible betrayal of trust by some clergy members. This healing is ongoing and is especially expressed in the many ways that our archdiocese continues to promote safe environment practices. This healing is also expressed in our efforts to rebuild trust, to rebuild fractured relationships and to rebuild our local Church made up of living stones.

To this end, I call all of us in the Archdiocese of Santa Fe to participate in the rebuilding of our local Church through the *Rebuild My Church* initiative. With the help of the Leadership Roundtable (a national Catholic organization that emerged from the height of the abuse crisis in 2002 whose mission is to assist dioceses, parishes and schools in restructuring), this initiative has already begun as we form deanery planning commissions that will assist the Deans in writing pastoral plans for each deanery. The Pastoral Center will be considered as the ninth deanery in the archdiocese. These combined nine pastoral plans, which are based on the input we received from our parishioners during the diocesan phase of the Synod for a Synodal Church, will form the Archdiocesan Master Pastoral Plan.

These pastoral plans are rooted in five "guardrails" or "foundations" that will weave their way through each of the plans. Hence, the plans will reflect clearly:

- 1. Sacred Scripture
- 2. Sacred Tradition
- 3. The Second Vatican Council
- 4. Catholic Social Teaching
- 5. The Petrine Ministry of Pope Francis

With these words, Jesus spoke to St. Francis as he prayed in front As mentioned above, the pastoral planning process we have begun is based on the input we received from our brothers and sisters in Christ who prayerfully participated in the Synodal process, a process rooted in prayer to the Holy Spirit. We have identified five major themes. They are purposely general but they give us good direction as we move forward. The five themes we have identified are these:

- 1. Education and Formation
- 2. Role of Women
- 3. The Life of the Spirit
- 4. Ecumenical and Interfaith Dialogue and Events
- 5. Forming Ourselves in Synodality

It is my hope to complete all the deanery pastoral plans sometime in the autumn. I will go to each deanery and accept the plan within the context of a Eucharistic Liturgy. We will have a final Mass at our beautiful cathedral to celebrate the Master Plan of the Archdiocese of Santa Fe. I anticipate that the plan will forge a path for us for the next 24 to 36 months. During the implementation of the plan, we will be looking to the future as we ready ourselves for the next planning session. In this way, we will always be discerning the promptings of the Holy Spirit, guiding and illuminating our path as we, a pilgrim people, make our way toward deeper union with God and with one another.

Please keep our *Rebuild My Church* initiative in your prayers and please be ready to respond to your dean and pastor as we embark on this exciting and grace-filled journey together. After all these years, we can still hear the Lord calling each of us to rebuild his Church. What a gift we have been given as we build on the labor of our ancestors in the faith and look to a future filled with hope and grace.




CRS Collection Weekend of March 9-10

UPDATE FROM THE HOLY LAND: Catholic Relief Services and our partners are responding to immediate needs of families facing hunger and displacement in the Holy Land.

The CRS Gaza team continues to expand operations even as daily bombardments continue and hunger reaches crisis levels. Gaza has become one of the deadliest places in the world for civilians: Since the start of the conflict, 26,422 Palestinians and 1,200 Israelis have been killed, 70% of whom are women and children. Access is a major challenge—this month, only 24% of planned distributions by agencies successfully reached their destinations in northern Gaza, where humanitarian needs are estimated to be highest and most severe.

The conflict has led to immense need for food. An estimated 90% of the population—2 million people—are facing acute food insecurity, the largest ever recorded globally. Currently, at least one in four families— more than half a million people face catastrophic conditions characterized by an extreme lack of food. An estimated 1.7 million people—75% of the population in Gaza—are displaced, with many living on the street without protection from the elements. Many people have been displaced multiple times as they search for safety. Lack of food, basic survival items, and poor hygiene exacerbate the already dire living conditions.

CRS and our local partners are coordinating with civil society organizations and humanitarian responders to provide the following:

Cash Assistance CRS has provided cash assistance to 21,197 families—127,182 people—since the conflict began.

Food CRS is working with the World Food Program to deliver food parcels to 22,129 families—110,645 people. CRS has also procured ready-to-eat food rations for 2,500 families.

Support for Church Partners CRS is supporting four churches in Gaza, where 850 people are temporarily sheltered. These sites are receiving cash assistance, food and other items.

Shelter and Hygiene Supplies CRS and our partners have distributed bedding supplies to 17,976 people, tarps to 4,227 families and tents for 430 families.

Logistics and Operations CRS established an office in Rafah with an adjacent warehouse. Our vendor distribution network has expanded across two governates. From our logistics hub in Cairo and with our Egypt team, CRS has procured bedding, hygiene and food supplies. We are transporting shipments across the Rafah border as access allows. Counseling Support CRS and partners are prioritizing psychological first aid, caregiver resources and referrals for specialized trauma, grief and other counseling and support.

In Lebanon CRS is supporting Caritas Lebanon to provide cash, food and hygiene kits to displaced families.

OUR COMMITMENT

At CRS, we believe that all human life is sacred, and we extend our support and solidarity for the safe, dignified lives of our sisters and brothers throughout the

Holy Land. We continue to work toward a shared future where people can flourish and live in just and peaceful societies.

Lenten Reflection

We can do our part by being active in social justice to look at root causes and by doing charitable works in meeting the basic needs of those in need. On the Road Towards Christian Unity # 2

The following excerpt is from the 2023 General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops

Ecumenism is first and foremost a matter of spiritual renewal that also requires processes for repentance and healing of

memory. The Assembly was moved to hear testimonies of Christians of different ecclesial traditions who share friendship, prayer and above all a commitment to the service of those experiencing poverty. Dedication to the least of these cements bonds and helps us focus on what already unites all believers in Christ. Therefore, it is important that ecumenism is practiced first and foremost in daily life. In theological and institutional dialogue, the patient weaving of mutual understanding continues in an atmosphere of growing trust and openness.

In not a few regions of the world there is an "ecumenism of blood", stemming from Christians of different affiliations who give their lives for faith in Jesus Christ. The testimony of their martyrdom is more eloquent than any words. Unity comes from the Cross of the Lord.

Collaboration among all Christians is crucial in addressing the pastoral challenges of our time. In secularized societies, this enables the voice of the Gospel to have greater force. In contexts of poverty, it impels people to join forces in the service of justice, peace and the dignity of the least. In all instances, it is a resource for healing the culture of hatred, division and war that pits groups, peoples and nations against

each other.


